CESA 4 Updates

Amanda Langrehr gave an update Regional Career Pathways grant presentation on the new template being developed with the assistance of regional manufacturers. The template will list job titles and the education or certificates needed to obtain those positions. Very positive feedback of the template and educators excited about the simplicity of it!

Western WI Workforce Development E3 WORKS!

Reminder of the work experience program that is available to 16-24 year olds that are not quite sure what career they want to go to school for.

The program places young adults with an employer for 6 to 8 weeks where the Workforce Development Board pays the wages and workman's comp insurance during that timeframe. Ryan and Kevin will share success stories within manufacturing for the new web site.
